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[NO PAY FOR] As you may know, Congress is considering other legislation to lower costs for health care, prescription drugs, child care, education, and electricity bills. [WITH PAY FOR] As you may know, Congress is considering other legislation to lower costs for health care, prescription drugs, child care, education, and electricity bills. The plan would include a tax cut to help working families pay for health care premiums, would allow Medicare to negotiate with drug companies to lower prescription drug costs, expand access to paid family and medical leave, and help families cover the cost of child care, elder care, and community college.

The plan is estimated to cost \$3.5 trillion and would be paid for by raising taxes on those earning over \$400,000 a year and on corporations. It would not increase the debt or raise taxes on any household making less than \$400,000 a year. **[SPLIT B]**
